The Law of Marriage Act, 1971

Enhanced stakeholders common understanding on the Review of the Law of Marriages Act, 1971

On 24th January 2022 Msichana Initiative brought together women and girls' rights representatives across the five regions in Tanzania (Arusha, Tabora, Shinyanga, Dodoma, and Dar es salaam). to review the proposed Model Bill that was put together by a team of legal experts that provides for the proposed amendments of the Law of Marriages Act, 1971.

The Stakeholders provided their inputs to the proposed model bill and resolved to push use the model as the advocacy tool to the public.

From 25th to 27th January Msichana Initiative coordinated a field immersion activity where 10 Women's and Girls' Rights movement members conducted a field immersion activity in Loliondo District, Arusha Region.

The movement members hosted by MIMUTIE Organization in Loliondo engaged with a Maasai community to learn about child marriages within cultural and traditional context of Maasai society and women's and girls' challenges and other cross-cutting issues.


In Tanzania more than 120,000 girls drop out of school annually, including 6500 due to pregnancy (World Bank). In November 2021 the government of Tanzania issued **Education Circular no. 2 of 2021** and proclaimed to re-admit teenage mothers to continue their studies after giving birth within formal education system. Later on the Ministry of Education released the guidelines for the implementation of the circular. Despite the positive developments the are some serious gaps within the guidelines which makes them impracticable with serious concerns on issues such as psychosocial support and economic aspects. Ans Yet the need to for the re-entry policy and legal framework.

As a key stakeholder in Education sector in Tanzania Msichana Initiative in this quarter actively engaged in;

- Consultation meeting with the Institute of Adult Education on Re-entry policy-25th January, 2022. MI followed up on the Institution's implementation plan on re-entry with regard to Education Circular No. 2 of 2021
- Participated in the National Caucus Meeting to Review the Re-entry Guideline (2-4th March 2022).



- Participated in the National Girls Caucus Meeting with Ministry of Education and Vocational Training (MOEST); President's Office Regional Administration and Local Government (PO-RALG) and Ministry of Community developement and Social Welfare to share caucus recommendation and address gaps identified in re-entry guideline
- Enhanced Ministries commitment to collect and work on stakeholders' recommendations to improve the re-entry guidelines for effective implementation.
 - Participated in the National Girls Education Caucus meeting with Tanzania Women's Parliamentarians Group to share recommendations and reflect on the roles of parliamentarians to push for incorporation of recommendation in re-entry guidelines

NPA/VAWC COMMITTEES

Msichana Initiatives works with the already established protection mechanisms to enhance protection of girls' rights through working with Women and Children Protection Committees/NPA VAWC Committees established under the National Plan of Action to End Violence against Women and Children (NPA/VAWC 2017/8-2021/2). In Engaging the committees one of Msichana Initiative's goal is to raise awareness and advocate for the minimum legal marriage age for young girls in Tanzania and sexual reproductive health and rights for girls.






CATALYTIC COMMUNITIES IN 6 PROGRAM REGIONS ARE SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR A GIRL CHILD

MSICHANA CAFES

In this Strategic Goal we mainly work with the Community through engaging Msichana Cafes where community members voluntarily join to discuss and look for solutions for girls' challenges in their communities especially child marriages and teen pregnancies. There are about 21 Msichana Cafes Platform working in 15 wards in Bahi District Dodoma Region (Kigwe, Mundemu, Msisi, Bahi Sokoni, Chikola, Chali Chipanga, Mpalanga, Ibugule, Mwitikila, Lamaiti, Zanka, Makanda, Babayu and Ibiwa). Msichana Cafes engage with with community members through public convenings and young girls through clubs. They are taking Initiatives to educate young girls and communities in schools, health centres, markets, women gatherings. They also report Gender Based Violence cases to local government authorities and Police Gender and Childrens' Desks.







Government Leaders supporting Msichana Cafes Interventions

The Regional Commissioner for Dodoma Region Hon. Antony Mtaka inspired by the work of Msichana Cafes in cooperation with Ward Councillors to enact by-laws for purposes of ending GBV in Bahi District. Directed all Districts in Dodoma to adopt the said by-laws. Hon. Mtaka recommended such actions to local government leaders in a meeting that gathered the government stakeholders and local development partners at *Cavlum Hotel*, on 23rd February, 2022.





Community Leaders Capacitated in GBV reporting

To enhance the capacity of Msichana Cafes leaders in reporting and documentation of GBV incidents within their localities, Msichana Initiative trained 35 Msichana Cafes leaders in 7 wards at Bahi District (Bahi Sokoni, Ibiwa, Msisi, Chali, Isanga, Mpalanga and Chipanga.







One Girl One Bike

Long distance to and from school is a barrier that puts girls at the risk of facing sexual and gender-based violence in Tanzania. One Girl One Bike seem to reduce such risks

The monitoring of the impact of the One Girl One Bike Project conducted in this quarter revealed a number of positive impact of the project to Girls in Tabora such as reduced risks of Gender Based Violence on the way to school; increased punctuality and improved academic performance





Girls can now resist temptations from perpetrators along the way who offer girls a ride to school with intention to intice them into sexual relations.

Bicycles helps girls to commute to and from school instead of walking long distance which expose them to risks of sexual violence.




Girls Empowerment in Agro-Ecology and Permaculture (GAPE)





Impact Story

By-laws used to stop child marriages at Lamaiti ward, Bahi District

On 18th Feb, 2022 a case was reported to Msichana Cafe by a 15 years old girl whose parents received bride price of 10 cows from Mr Jackson (name changed). On 19th Feb, 2022 Msichana Cafe Leaders reported to District Police Officer (OCD) whereas on 20th February 2022 The OCD visited the Lukali Village at Lamaiti ward, Bahi District where the incident has occured. The OCD managed to stop the purpoted marriage and ordered the parents from both sides to pay a sum of 90,000/Tshs (45,000 Tshs each) as provided in the written by-laws.

The by-laws were passed in the last quarter of the year 2021 through integrated efforts of Msichana Cafes (community platforms supported by Msichana Initiative and Local government leaders.)

Community members are now using these by-laws as advocacy tool to prevent child marriages and other forms of GBV in Bahi District but also to hold accountable perpetrators of child marriages






